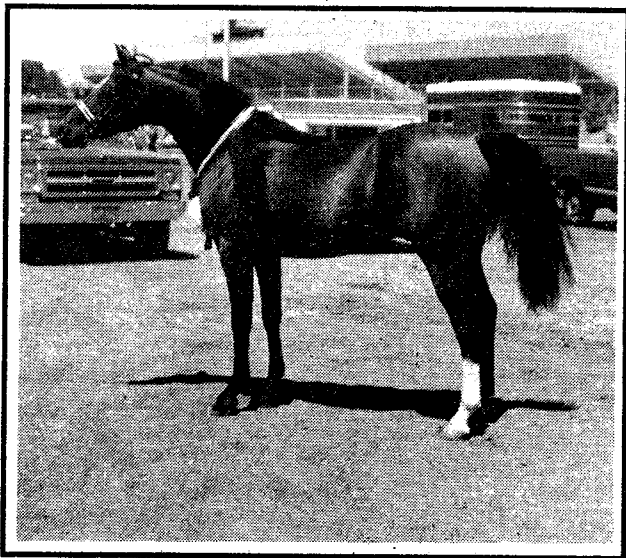




THE LEGACY OF CHARLENE HARMON LAMBERT and DYNASTY ARABIANS

DYNASTY RAFFONEL

It is very difficult to write about a friend. How can you condense 25 years of friendship into a few paragraphs?

Charlene Harmon Lambert passed away in July, 1988 after a valiant battle with cancer. Our 1989 Annual Summer show is being dedicated in her honor.

Although not a "big" breeder, Charlene has left her mark on the Arabian breed. Many DAHA members have horses with Dynasty Arabians breeding in their pedigrees.

Dynasty Arabians began in the mid-sixties, starting as many of us have, with Half Arabians. Then

came the chestnut Crabbet bred Stallion, Ibn Azrek-Sanfoin. The foundation mares were Miss Farwa (Azrek Skowronek x Tari Saba) and Rakhiya (Rakafix x Hiya). From these mares a "dynasty" was founded. Rakhiya was the dam of Dynasty Raffonel who was by Raffon++, and the head man for all of the years at Dynasty. In his show career he won several championships and was judged Most Classic.

Char was a dedicated breeder. She believed in type, presence and correct conformation. She was attracted to the breed because of the prettiness and presence and she wanted to breed that kind of horse. She studied bloodlines and talked to other breeders for hours and hours. She did not believe in fads; rather she bred horses that she believed fulfilled the Arabian idea.

Char had a special knack for using young stallions that later became champions. Raffon++ was used several times, SX Saladin, The Real McCoy, Royal Binis++, Grande Duke++, Comar Raffdazon, Dynasty Grand-Dur, Bay Rouge, Comar Bay Beau++, Dynasty Kalua and *Sidi Brahim. If she really liked a stallion, distance didn't matter. Trips to Washington to breed to Bay Rouge, Comar Raffdazon and Comar Bay Beau were made and even to the mid-west to breed to GG Jabask++ and her dream stallion, Gazon. Early on, Char noticed the young stallion, Gamaar. She leased a mare to breed to him, and purchased a young champion daughter. Raydells Madurai and Dynasty Gamaarla were the FIRST Gamaar daughters in California!

Those who remember Char, will picture her as a small, blond "dynamo". She was full of energy and always eager to work. For many years, she printed the DAHA newsletter, (she was a printer by trade), DAHA directories, show programs, premium lists, you name it, she took care of it, including ad layouts and design. And if that wasn't enough, she served on and was a very active member of the DAHA Board of Directors.

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FROM THE PRESIDENT

From the President,

The best and most interesting club-related event of the month occurred last evening, and it warrants a brief description and a few thank yous. Dr. Larry Gosselin, of the North State Equine Veterinary Hospital, and two vet student assistants who are at the hospital for the summer, put on a wet clinic to teach the clinic's participants about the reproductive anatomy and physiology of the mare. It was an absolutely fascinating evening. After a slide presentation illustrating the structures of the reproductive tract, we examined these structures hands on (see the accompanying photo) and dissected ovaries, follicles, oviducts, corpora lutea, the uterus, and the cervix. One of the specimens had a 60-day old fetus, which we got to look at closely. We then saw a demonstration of semen collection and examined the cervix of a mare with a speculum. We all came away from the clinic with a good deal more knowledge than we had coming in and with an appreciation of how difficult it must be for our vets to pinpoint and diagnose reproductive tract phenomena by palpation. Some of those follicles were awfully small!

My thanks to Dr. Gosselin for an extremely educational and enjoyable evening and for his willingness to donate a percentage of the proceeds from the clinic to our club. Thanks also to Gladys and Vern Ryan for their hospitality and for allowing us to use Hermoso Caballo's facilities for the evening. I'm hoping to convince Dr. Gosselin to repeat the clinic next year for those of you who weren't able to attend.

See you in Vallejo, and good luck to those of you showing there!

She convinced the Delta Horsemen to have one in Antioch and after two successful shows the Delta Horsemen felt it was too much work, so Char, Colleen and Jim Swift, Joe Arnolfo, the Cunninghams, the Hendershots and a few others took on the task and it became a very successful Charity Show. Each year it became bigger and bigger and along with it a tremendous amount of work and responsibility. Char made a proposal to the DAHA Board and asked them to take over the show. She told them, "It will prove to be a big asset to the Club", and as usual, she was right! At one time, our show was the biggest Class C show in the United States. With the success of the previous shows, that prompted the decision for the next show to go Class A. You can imagine Char's pride knowing that her stallion, Dynasty Raffonel was once chosen Champion Stallion at a DAHA show and also one year judged Most Classic.

When Charlene became ill, Raffonnel and many of the horses were brought to the Hendershots. Miss Farwa and Rakhiya will live out their lives with dear friend, Carolyn Frisbey. Bobby Najera was always there to help and a good portion of his horses are Char's breeding.

I recently remembered that it was Char who introduced me to Bob and JoAnn Raymond many years ago. It is very special to all of us that the unborn foal, now named Dynasty Finale (The Real Dynasty x Miss Raffona) belongs to the Raymonds. How sad, that she never had the chance to see the last foal she ever bred winning in the show ring. How proud she would be of this champion grandson of Dynasty Raffonel, Raydells Madurai, Raffon++ and Miss Farwa. This is Charlene's legacy.

It is fitting that we continue to honor and appreciate the people who have dedicated so much of their time to the Arabian horse. And did it for the LOVE of the breed.

If you never met Char, you missed knowing a very special person.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

DAHA recently held their 3rd Annual Breakfast Ride. While I am a strong supporter of such activities, I was surprised to find out that we had not only invited the San Ramon Valley Horsemen's Association to join us, but that they would be the club in charge of the ride.

I think it is important that we do joint efforts with other local clubs in hopes of sharing new ideas and expanding our network of horse enthusiasts. However, if it is to our function, I think we should have some control over how it is run.

The ride to the Diablo Ranch was pleasant for most of the riders. Some of my group complained that the trail "bosses" from the SRVHA threatened them repeatedly with citations for various things that they considered to be infractions of their rules. One rider was threatened with a citation when he stepped off the trail to wait for part of his group. He was told to strictly remain on the trail or get a citation. I was not aware that the SRVHA had such authority. Many of the trail bosses provided by the SRVHA were not familiar with the trails and relied on our Club members to guide them to the Diablo Ranch. In my opinion, a person with such authority should at least know the area in which he/she is guiding the ride.

The breakfast portion of the Breakfast Ride was fabulous. The food was delicious and the setting, as always, was delightful. I thought the food was better than ever and I commend the caterer for a terrific job.

On the way back to the designated staging area, there were even more problems with the SRVHA trail bosses. At one point, in an effort to "assist" a horse and rider through a creek, the trail boss proceeded to whip the horse with his reins. This type of behavior is intolerable. It is one thing for a person to use a whip on his own horse, but to have another person whip your horse while you are on it is outrageous! This behavior increases the chance of a horse and rider being hurt, not to mention that it is uncalled for.

Several other instances occurred along the ride home, where horses were hit or threatened by the trail bosses. One teenaged girl, riding a borrowed horse, became so frightened after one of the trail bosses hit her horse, that she got off and walked all the way home. I don't believe that anyone has the right or authority to hit another person's horse. I am gravely disappointed in the behavior of these trail bosses and I would recommend that if DAHA is ever to put on another breakfast ride, that we do it solely as a club function.

DAHA's FIRST NATRC COMPETITIVE TRAIL RIDE

OCTOBER 6, 7 and 8, 1989

The ride Chairperson, Kathy Nixon and Ride Secretary, Pamela Krebbers have the organization of this function well under control, however a few dependable, but not necessarily experienced, people are still needed in order to guarantee a smooth running event.

If anyone would like to help out, here are a few positions we need to fill.

- **P & R Teams:** Several teams are used on a ride. Don't worry, there is on the job training available.
- **Secretaries:** For the Vet judges and Horsemanship Judges.
- **Parking:** Need to be available Friday, Noon til dark.
- **Weight Steward:** Everyone must be weighed in before the ride.
- **Night Steward:** To pass through the stabling area now and then during the night beginning around 10:00 PM. If we get enough volunteers, we'll arrange shifts.
- **Timers:** To time in the riders. 2 watches are required.
- **Drag Riders:** We need 4 each on Saturday and Sunday. Driver w/4-Wheel to transport the vets and P&R teams.
- **Horse Ambulance:** Someone with a truck and trailer to be available at the ride in case of an emergency.
- **Scorecard Checkers:** To make sure cards are scored correctly.
- **Cleanup Crew:** We have a neat group but we need to make sure the camp is kept in good order.
- **Miscellaneous:** If you want to help, we'll find a spot for you. There is plenty to keep us busy and "Gofers" are helpful.

Please call if you would like to volunteer. Class sponsorships are \$25 and we need various items and services to raffle. This is a Club event and we need club members to help make it a success. You need no experience to join in the fun. The best way to learn about NATRC is to participate!

NATRC (North American Trail Ride Conference) uses time, distance and stress as judging criteria. Therefore, this event should not be confused with endurance riding where speed is so important.

Judging is based upon each horse starting the ride with a score of 100 points evaluated as follows: Soundness = 40%. Condition = 40%. Manners = 15%. Way of going = 5%, and each rider must complete the ride within a certain time period, careful not to come across the finish too early or too late, or points will be deducted from their score. While primary judging is on the horse, the riders also compete for Horsemanship Awards and are judged on the care and handling of their mounts throughout the entire ride.

Competitive Trail Riding can be fun for the whole family and there is something for everyone to do, so come out and join in on the fun. The ride is based at Bort Meadows in Anthony Chabot Park in the Oakland Hills. Watch for more information in the September newsletter, but in the mean time you can call if you have any questions. WHAT'S NEW WITH THE REGION III GELDING PROMOTION COMMITTEE ?

Ours is a very active committee, in fact, I believe that we can state that Region III has the most active gelding promotion organization of any region in the nation. We work through our 17 member clubs to enable us to coordinate 7 separate programs. Our "Matching Fund Program" makes up to \$200 available to each club to use for gelding promotion.

To create a market for the young gelding, we have created our "Junior Gelding Program" which offers prize money in yearling and two year old gelding classes and a junior gelding championship class. This money is available to both Class A and open shows.

Several programs are aimed at the amateur showing a gelding. The "High Point Program" and "Amateur Performance Gelding Award Program" were developed to award the performance horse. **Prize money is given in all gelding performance classes**, both amateur and open at the Region III Class A Show held in June.

A new program for 1989 makes a "Special Region III Gelding Trophy" available to clubs to be used for gelding promotion however they wish. Many are given at open and schooling shows to the high point Arabian gelding. The program which makes all of the above possible is

our fund raising program, the "Breeder's Silent Bid Bonanza". Thanks to the generous donation of breedings by Region III stallion owners, money is raised by the purchase of these breedings using the silent bid method. In order to encourage participation by horse owners who may not be interested in purchasing a breeding at this time, we plan to widen the scope of this program to include products and services of use to all horse owners and breeders. 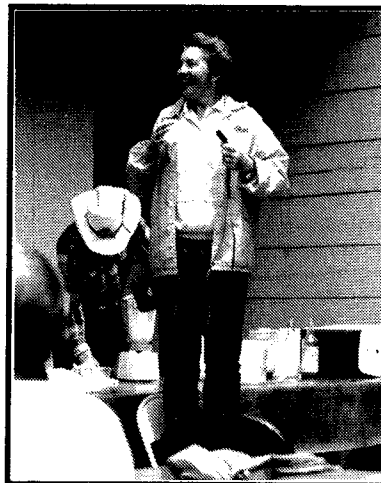

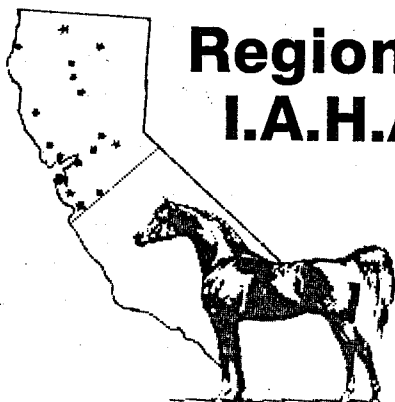

Well, the day finally came, so Pamela and I got Amber

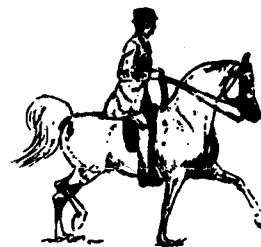

DRUG TESTING FOR HORSE HANDLERS ISN'T IT TIME?

The 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea set a precedent in international athletic competition. Seven gold medalists were stripped of their awards in a variety of events for testing positive for the use of drugs and steroids.

In the wake of the Reagan Administration's campaign of "Just Say No" and the media surrounding the drug problem in America, you would think that the use of drugs in areas of public attention would be on the way out. If the behavior of many of the horses and handlers currently in the ring is an indication, the Arabian horse industry has not caught on.

Drug testing of athletes has long been accepted. The Olympics were a perfect example. The testing of our equine athletes is common knowledge and is put into practice on the local level as well as the national and international levels.

In our seemingly political arena of halter competition, it is up to the handlers to present the horses in their best light. Why then shouldn't these handlers be expected to adhere to the same strict standards as the horses they are showing?

It has become very obvious of late that some major trainers are competing under the influence. Their horses' attitudes clearly reflect the erratic behavior of the trainers that is synonymous with the use of drugs and alcohol.

To ignore the scene in our Arabian shows as it is clearly viewed in the public eye, would be the same as allowing Olympic athletes to walk away with the ill-gotten gold after using drugs, thus condoning the use of illegal substances to enhance athletic endeavors.

Most of the drugs are used to lower inhibitions and create a feeling of increased confidence. What kind of example are we setting in an industry where we pride ourselves on the natural beauty of the Arabian horse? It has come to the point where newcomers in the audience are questioning this as part and parcel of the Arabian scene. It is becoming more difficult to ignore the obvious problem and to explain the events to these innocents while keeping their interest and respect for becoming more involved with our horses. Not to mention that the Arabian industry prides itself on the wholesome family approach to their activities. Our junior riders and exhibitors are well supported and they look up to the top trainers for guidance and direction. What kind of example are we allowing to be set for these youngsters?

The International Arabian Horse Association has a Code of Ethics. Perhaps it is time we were reminded:

a. That the noble Arabian Horse, most ancient of all breeds, a creature of beauty and an athlete of reknown, has earned and deserves the company of true sportsment;

b. That owners, breeders, handlers and friends of the Arabian horse have much to gain by observing the highest ethical standards and by observing the best tenets of good sportsmanship in all things pertaining to the Arabian Horse.;

c. That, in addition to the basic rule of "Doing unto others as you would have them do unto you," it is desirable to define ethical practices to delineate unethical practices to encourage good sportsmanship and high ethical behavior and to warn, censure, or bring to public attention and discipline those who commit acts detrimental to the best interests of the breed and to its good friends.

The IAHA has set up a committee to ensure the adherence to these codes, the Ethical Practice Review Board, whose function shall be "to interpret and enforce the ethical and sportsmanship rules promulgated and adopted by IAHA". These rules, as they apply to the trainers and handlers state:

a. The ring conduct of any exhibitor shall not be such as to affect adversely the exhibition of any other's horse in the ring.

b. Owners, handlers and trainers will at all times treat members of the Proud Breed of Arabian Horse with the kindness, respect and affection, which his long history deserves. At no time in training or in the show ring will he be subject to mistreatment.

The handlers who use drugs do not abide by these rules. Their horses are disruptive to their class. They are frightened by their handlers' treatment, often exhibiting panic and frantic behavior. Such behavior is not the product of kindness, respect and affection, but of erratic, severe treatment. We owe it to our Proud Arabians to stop this abuse. Drug testing is becoming wide-spread to ensure proper conduct within many major industries. Why not the Arabian Industry? We need to preserve our dignity and integrity if the breed is to prosper.

Drug abuse leads to physical abuse of our horses. Isn't it time we stand up and just say, NO?

AMARA ARABIANS is located exactly 1.5 miles from the corner of Watsonville Rd and Uvas Rd. in Morgan Hill. We are nestled into the far corner of Uvas Reservoir, giving us a very scenic location.

We currently have *Ibn Moniet El Nefous and *Ibn Hafiza mares to breed this line. They are nice size and very athletic.

Our stallion, "Duke Admar" is a flashy bay Crabbet/Polish/Egyptian bred stallion with a kind disposition, and he does pass this on to his babies. He successfully competes in Eventing, Jumping, Dressage, Trail Competition, Endurance, English Pleasure, Western Pleasure, Halter and Liberty Classes.
